

Small Group Opportunity New Study begins March 18


If you're looking for more fellowship, join a newer small group that meets the first and third Tuesday evenings

From the Pastor's Desk



Americans' Changing Behavior

Alarm bells first went off when Robert Putnam wrote *Bowling Alone*,

published in 2000. Putnam discussed ways in which Americans were increasingly disengaged from attendance at public meetings, community service, and work with political parties. Putnam also cited Americans' growing distrust in government. This extended to other institutions—presumably the church.

Over the past twenty-five years things have mostly gotten worse. Perhaps the most important recent alarm went off with Derek Thompson's cover article in the Atlantic, "The Anti-Social Century." Like Putnam, Thompson places blame for the de-socialization mostly on the increase of new technologies. We could discuss for a long while which technologies are most pernicious, and how to protect ourselves and our offspring. But just as importantly we could acknowledge both a great challenge, and an opportunity, that the antisocial bent brings to the church. First the challenge.

People are not flocking to church like they did in the post war era. After WWII many (mostly men) were thankful to have survived a horrible war, came home, went to school on the GI bill, found a job, joined a service club, married and raised a family. Our Sunday schools swelled, and churches were full. Today it's the opposite. Marriages that produce children are getting scarce. In an era of shrinking population and expectations, clearly, the church needs to become more creative in reaching out to the surrounding community.

But think of the opportunities the current epidemic of loneliness presents. Ah, look at all the lonely people- — but do they all want to remain lonely? Not all. That's where the church has a tremendous opportunity. The church can offer genuine fellowship: a non-commercial place to gather where relationship to God and others can flourish. Any church that offers a place where loving friends bear each other's burdens, will find the good news of Christ still offers a powerful remedy for lonely hearts.
